Yale School of Nursing Global Health Concentration

Rationale

The Global Health Concentration was developed to meet the increasingly important need to prepare YSN students to serve global populations both domestically and internationally as clinicians, educators, scholars, researchers and policy makers. Students will be exposed to a wide range of global health concepts through their interdisciplinary didactic experiences and through their global scholarly and clinical work.

Objectives

After completing the requirements for the global health concentration students will:

- 1. Describe the interplay of economic, social, environmental, cultural, and political factors in health and disease in global populations
- 2. Explain the need for interdisciplinary approaches to improving global health
- Develop advanced skills with which to improve the health status of global populations living locally and internationally through collaborative clinical practice, scholarship, research, and leadership development
- 4. Discuss challenges of providing health care, conducting research, and developing local leadership skills in resource-limited settings to populations of different cultural backgrounds
- 5. Demonstrate increased cultural competency and cultural safety among diverse populations
- 6. Describe the challenges of seeking and providing health care to individuals speaking a language different than their own
- 7. Develop a philosophy of nursing practice which reflects nursing's responsibilities for vulnerable global populations in domestic and international settings

Application process

- Students must apply using the application form to the Global Health Concentration in the first semester of their first specialty year in order to have sufficient time for completion of course work, clinical work, and scholarship.
- 2. Approved courses successfully taken for credit in previous semesters may be applied to the concentration requirements.
- 3. Students must be in good academic standing having completed all required coursework and clinical requirements for the year of study with no incomplete or failing grades.
- 4. Students will provide a faculty reference supporting student aptitude for additional work and commitment to global health.
- Students will submit a personal statement of goals in seeking admission to the concentration.This document may describe prior activities related to global health and current philosophy of nursing with global populations.
- 6. Fluency in another language is not required for admission to the concentration but is a highly regarded skill and will be considered when the application is reviewed.

Global Health Concentration Plan of Study

- Course work includes 2 additional graduate level courses in global health. Students may
 explore options at a variety of schools and departments at Yale and must have courses
 approved by GHC faculty. Approved courses taken at Yale before application to the
 concentration will be accepted for fulfilment of requirements.
 - Yale offers a wide range of graduate level courses exploring the social, political and economic determinants of health. Although nursing is not the specific focus of these courses, the courses expose YSN students to the range of interdisciplinary issues that affect the health of global populations. These courses have all been approved by the curriculum committees of each school and so reflect high standards of academic rigor.
- Clinical/Application: Minimum of 2 credits (60 hrs) in an international setting with YSN-approved preceptors or in a domestic setting with international, immigrant, refugee,
 American Indian, Alaskan native or rural populations. In keeping with YSN concentration guidelines, these clinical hours are in addition to clinical hours required by students' specialties.
 - All students will participate in a required clinical conference coordinated by GHC faculty. It is expected that 30 hours of face- to- face global experiences will be completed in the spring semester of first specialty year and the final 30 hrs. completed in the fall semester of the second specialty year. These hours will be documented on E-Value
 - The clinical conference will give students the opportunity to reflect on and discuss the challenges of working with global populations. Issues of cultural sensitivity, cultural competence and linguistics appreciation will also be reinforced. Selected readings will energize the discussions.
 - All students will submit a 4-6-page paper to their GHC faculty advisor reflecting on their clinical/application experiences and documenting observations, insights and challenges of working with global populations.
- Scholarly work: Students will complete one of the following options
 - o Praxis elective (N 704) with focus on topic relevant to global health
 - One document (concept paper, case study, critique) submitted to Master's eportfolio with focus on topic relevant to global health

Role of Office of Global Health

- Pat Ryan-Krause is the faculty coordinator of the concentration. She will be faculty for the clinical conference.
- The Office of Global Health will maintain a portfolio for each student in the Global Health Concentration to assure that requirements are being met. The portfolio will contain application materials, records of courses being taken and written requirements for these courses, and response papers.
